

Arthur Auyeung, a CAA Travel Consultant with a decade of industry experience, offers tips and advice for travelling to Europe

## Where are Canadians travelling right now?

We've seen interest in many European destinations rebound in 2022, including the United Kingdom, Italy, France and Greece.

## What are some reputable experiences that are back up and running?

There's an increase in demand for European cruises, river cruises and group tours. Cruising was the first experience to pick up, and more recently, we've seen coach tours on the radar of many travellers. There's also been interest in small group and private tours.

#### Any tips for booking tours?

Make a reservation with a reputable supplier and review their cancellation policy as well as the tour meeting and drop-off points. Keep in mind that it's common in most European destinations to give a small tip to the tour guide as a token of appreciation.


## Do vou have any advice for exploring Europe solo?

Travel in the off-season from November to February to enjoy better pricing and fewer crowds. Consider travelling by rail, which is a safe, cost-effective mode of transportation. While many places accept credit cards, have some local currency on-hand. And comfortable walking shoes are a must. Reach out to a CAA Travel Consultant for more tips.

# How should I prepare for the unexpected?

As there's still some uncertainty around international travel, I strongly encourage everyone to purchase travel insurance to protect against unforeseen events-like if you become ill or injured while away, or if your luggage is lost. If you're planning to check bags, pack some emergency supplies in your carry-on, such as basic toiletries and a change of clothes. I also suggest subscribing to flight alerts with the airline to ensure you receive the latest updates on changes or delays to your trip. That way you can avoid unnecessary wait times.

# What to Do if You're in a Collision

A quick-reference guide to ease a stressful situation — Craig Moy

**CAA MEMBERS KNOW** the importance of driving safely, but even the best drivers can get in a collision. If it happens to you, follow these tips to help make the post-crash process a little less stressful.

### AT THE SCENE

- Stop your vehicle it's a crime to leave the scene of a collision.
- Call 911 if anyone is injured or if the total damage to all vehicles appears to be more than \$2,000. You should also call emergency services if you suspect the other driver is impaired.
- Record the collision details, including your speed, the location and road conditions.
   Take photos and video of the scene if it's safe to do so.
- When safely possible, move your vehicle to the roadside. Turn

- on your hazard lights and set up traffic cones, if available.
- Exchange drivers' licence details, phone numbers and insurance information with everyone involved. Get the contact details of any witnesses too.
- If police are on scene, answer their questions honestly, but don't admit fault. That's up to your insurance company to determine.

## IN THE AFTERMATH

 Drive your vehicle to the nearest Collision Reporting Centre (CRC), if possible.

- Find one near you at accsupport.com. If your vehicle needs a tow, don't authorize it without speaking to your insurance company.
- Complete the collision-reporting process at the CRC. This will include providing any documentation of the incident and having your vehicle photographed.
- Open a claim with your insurance company, finalize repair arrangements and get answers to any other questions you may have.

Easy yet effective ways to keep up with your workout during the holiday season -Katherine Singh

AS YOUR SCHEDULE FILLS with preparations for the holidays and gatherings with family and friends, your fitness routine may not be top of mind.

"Some of the major obstacles to training during the holidays include a new social calendar that may include parties, dinners and events that conflict with your usual training," says Jennifer Lau, principal owner of Toronto-based gym Fit Squad.

But there are still some simple ways to get your heart pumping while you manage your commitments.

### Work out anywhere

You don't need much equipment or space to exercise, whether you're at your in-laws' house, waiting for a flight or heading to a festive event.

For simple yet effective cardio, Lau suggests walking or taking the stairs whenever possible. Use your own body weight for squats, lunges and push-ups to build strength.

Travel with a set of resistance bands, flexible bands that add tension to your stretches. Use them in your arm and leg movements to strengthen and tone muscles.

# Set goals


Your motivation may wane during a busy period, so it's important to set realistic and achievable expectations.

If you typically do five workout sessions a week, aim for three when you're staying at your aunt's place, for example. Or run 10 kilometres over the course of seven days rather than all in one morning.

# **POWERED UP**

Here's what to know about all-wheel drive in electric vehicles -Matt Rubbers

**OR A GROWING NUMBER** of Canadian drivers, all-wheel drive (AWD) is a must-have vehicle feature. If that's you, you may be surprised to learn that not only do many electric vehicles (EVs) have it, but their systems are in many ways better than conventional all-wheel drive.

# **How it works**

In a traditional AWD system, "You only have a single motor, and it uses a series of gears and shafts to deliver power to the front and rear wheels," explains Ryan Peterson, manager of automotive services for CAA South Central Ontario. "The fourwheel drive on my truck, or any modern truck, isn't really that different from that of a 1970s Chevy," he says.

"Electric AWD vehicles instead typically have two separate motors: one at the front and one in the rear." As a result, there's no need for a bulky driveshaft running the length of the car, which means more legroom for passengers.

## Improved handling

In theory, electric AWD vehicles also have

better grip and traction on snow and ice. Electricity can be directed to an engine more accurately than gasoline. "Electric AWD is more precise, and the software allows greater control," Peterson says. His electric SUV feels more stable. refined and controlled than his old truck in slippery conditions, he says.

Some upcoming electric pickups from Tesla and Rivian include four motors—one at each wheel. These quad-motor AWD systems enable tank turns, which allow the vehicle to spin 180 degrees on the spot.

Electric AWD systems do have some of the same pitfalls as their combustionengine counterparts: reduced driving range and higher cost. For example, the AWD version of Hyundai's electric Ionig 5 has 74 kilometres less driving range and costs \$3,000 more than the rear-drive model.

Nevertheless, if you're weighing the pros and cons of switching to an EV, electric AWD is definitely a beneficial feature.

**ASK AN EXPERT** 



CAA auto expert Ryan Peterson answers your questions

In the summer 2022 issue of CAA Magazine, there was an article about charging EVs, which mentioned: "Charging an EV's battery does take longer than filling a gas tank, though. Many variables affect battery charging speed, but in general, a 15-to-20-minute stop at one of the latest generations of fast chargers can net an extra 300 km of driving range."

Is there a charge (pardon the pun) for charging an EV? Is it like paying for air to inflate your tires? If you do have to pay to charge an EV, how is the price calculated? Per minute, for example? Also, is the actual process of charging an EV at a charging station a simple one?

—Min Raber

A: Short of a few places that currently offer free electricity, there's a fee to charge. However, instead of paying for the volume of fuel—or in this case kilowatts (kW)—EVs are charged based on the length of time plugged in. Some places may also add a fee for the charge rate. For example, at a local supercharger, when your session is charging at its highest rate, you may be paying \$1.30 per minute. As your charging speed slows, the fee drops with it to around 26 cents per minute. Like gas prices, rates can vary wildly, so it pays to be watchful.

### **House calls**

Ask a friend, family member or neighbour to drop by your home regularly to pick up mail, flyers and community bulletins. Have any newspaper and magazine subscriptions paused. Arrange for a snow removal service to clear your porch, driveway and sidewalk.

#### Set timers on your lights

Have the interior and exterior lights automatically turn on and off throughout the day. Consider using a Wi-Fi-enabled smart light system to remotely control the lighting from your mobile device.

### **Control the temperature**

Set the thermostat high enough to keep the water pipes from freezing. You can also install a water-flow sensor on your main water supply pipe, which sends an alert to your mobile device if there's an issue with your interior or exterior pipes.

### Secure the premises

Activate your security system, if you have one, and check that all doors and windows are locked. Consider specialized locks on sliding glass doors and deadbolt locks on windows. Store any valuables in a deposit box or safe.

# The Latest Buzz on Tinnitus

How to identify, manage and live with this common condition

# DO YOU HEAR THAT RINGING?

It could be tinnitus, a condition that impacts one in three Canadians. Tinnitus is described as a phantom noise with no external sound source. It manifests as a constant ring, buzz, whistle, static or siren sound. The noise might come and go, stick around for a few months, or stay with you for life. But the sooner tinnitus is diagnosed by a hearing care professional, the better the chance of improvement. The team at Connect Hearing can help you prevent, identify and manage your tinnitus.

# What causes tinnitus?

Although commonly associated with older people, tinnitus can affect anyone at any age. Some instances occur as a result of infections, blockages in the ear canal, head or neck injuries, and some medications. Other factors that may increase your risk are loud noise, age, tobacco and alcohol use, or various health issues, like high blood pressure and cardiovascular problems.

## Is it harmful?

Medically speaking, no. But a tinnitus assessment is important to help identify what started it, as the underlying cause could have a medical solution or require medical treatment. A permanent noise in the ear can be distracting, aggravating and make it harder to sleep, which is why many sufferers report stress, anxiety and a lack of concentration.

#### How do I know I have tinnitus?

The sound in the ear is unique to each patient—tone, pitch and volume vary greatly. You might only hear it in one ear, and sometimes it's in the very centre of the head. It might come in wave-like intervals, or it could be continuous. If the noise lasts longer than 24 hours, seek medical advice or book a tinnitus assessment at Connect Hearing.

## How is it diagnosed?

Since 80 percent of tinnitus sufferers

experience some degree of hearing loss, your Connect Hearing professional will conduct a full audiological test. The examiner will also ask about pre-existing conditions, triggers and details about the intrusive noise, and measure its pitch and loudness.

## How do you treat tinnitus?

Treatment depends on the root cause of your tinnitus but usually includes a mix of coping techniques, sound therapy and hearing devices. Though there's not currently a drug to reverse the effects of tinnitus, medication can help control secondary symptoms. # PREVENTING PORCH PIRATES

Helpful tips to keep your packages safe

S THE HOLIDAYS approach, more Canadians shop online. Last year, consumers in Canada planned to spend about 37 percent of their gift budget online, reports Statista, an international market and consumer analysis company.

With all these added deliveries, it's also prime time for thieves to steal packages right from your front door. According to finder.com, a comparison and information platform, one in four Canadians have had their deliveries stolen. Ten percent of those lost an item worth more than \$250.

Fortunately, there are ways you can help protect your shipments.

### **Basic protection**

If you expect to be home when packages arrive, ask the shipper to require a signature when possible. If you won't be around:

- ask the courier to deliver the parcel to a trusted neighbour
- opt to pick up your package in-store

If you're handy, consider repurposing an old chest or dresser into a delivery box for parcels. Place it in an inconspicuous spot on your porch, secure it with a lock and let your courier know how to access it.

#### Go high-tech

Combat would-be thieves with technology.

- Install a doorbell camera, which allows you to monitor and record any activity at your door. Some are accessible directly from a smartphone and allow for two-way talking.
- Use motion-sensor lights to scare away potential stealers.

- Set up security cameras to discourage trespassers wary of being recorded.
- Purchase a package guard or porch pirate bag, a reinforced nylon bag that locks to your front door or gate. Instruct the courier to place your package inside and close it using the combination lock.

With these proactive measures, you'll deter those looking to add your packages to their own gift list.

# **HOW TO BUILD A BACKYARD ICE RINK**

Lace up and hit the ice on a homemade skating rink

0

First, measure your rink on a flat and level area. Clear any snow and debris from the ground.

Drive wooden garden stakes into the ground at each of the rink's corners, then wrap twine around the stakes to create an outline.

Construct the rink frame by laying planks of plywood or lumber, securing the corners with angle brackets. For added support, place wooden or rebar stakes along all sides of the frame.



Lay a clear or white plastic tarp inside the walls of the rink. The liner should hang over the frame by roughly three centimetres. Smooth out any wrinkles and secure it with spring clips. Ensure there are no holes.



Use a garden hose to fill your rink. Always monitor the water level. A minimum of five to eight centimetres of water is recommended for a solid base that can withstand the weight of several skaters.



Allow the water to freeze. The process can take up to a few days depending on the size of your rink and the temperature. Generally, you'll need at least two nights below -10°C.

Once the ice is solid, staple the overhanging tarp to the rink frame.

To maintain a smooth skating surface throughout the winter, sweep the ice regularly using a curling broom. Pick one up from Walmart, where CAA Members earn two percent back in CAA Dollars® when shopping online through the CAA eStore.

Flood your rink with water about once a week for optimal ice conditions.

# Where Do Old Cars Go?

HERE'S WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR VEHICLE ONCE YOU'RE FINISHED WITH IT

service, imagine your beloved truck, which has covered more than 300,000 km in daily commutes, grocery runs and road trips, suddenly stops working. The upholstery is torn, the transmission is shot, the body has rusted—it can't go anywhere. Now what?

An estimated 1.6 million vehicles are taken off the road each year in Canada, but what happens to them next isn't well documented. A few are offered as donations, while others are stripped for parts, recycled or simply thrown out. Here are the most common options.

## Finding a new purpose

Some people donate their car, truck or SUV to charity, many of which will accept them in working and non-working order, and then sell them for parts. You'll get a tax receipt for its value, as well as peace of mind for supporting a good cause (see "Recycle Your Ride," page 25).

In rare cases, some autos get a second life on the silver screen, thanks to movie-car lots, such as Toronto's Picture Vehicle Specialities. They'll occasionally buy rare, rundown cars to be used as static props, background cars or to be blown up in an action scene.



# **Scrapping old models**

The vast majority of vehicles that have reached the end of their life, however, eventually go to scrap metal yards or auto recyclers, says Steve Fletcher, managing director of the Automotive Recyclers of Canada (ARC), an association representing 400 recyclers across the country.

Fletcher admits there's a lot of overlap between the two types of businesses, but explains that scrap metal yards are mainly interested in recovering and selling metal. On the other hand, auto recyclers buy end-of-life vehicles in order to recover and sell valuable parts in addition to the raw metal. As part of the process, recyclers also safely remove oil, fuel, airbags, tires and batteries to

make the vehicles less polluting when they hit the landfill.

"Scrap car prices depend on the vehicle's year, make, model, mileage, condition and location, including towing costs," Fletcher says. "For most of Ontario, recyclers pay between \$500 and \$1,000, while prices on the east and west coasts seem to run about two-thirds of that."

After vehicles are stripped of useful parts and/or pollutants, the remaining shell is typically crushed and sent to a shredder to meet its final fate.

Shredding is exactly as it sounds. The Triple M Metals shredder in Hamilton, Ont., for example, is the size of a large three-storey house. Its spinning metal teeth can chew up and spit out

an entire car, turning that once-beloved family chariot into fist-sized chunks of metal confetti in just 30 seconds. Much of the resulting metal can then be melted down and remanufactured into something new.

## **Managing waste**

On average, 85 percent of a vehicle's weight can be recycled or reused, with the other 15 percent—usually plastic, glass and foam-ending up in a landfill, Fletcher says.

But the result is still a huge amount of waste, considering that we're talking about 1.6 million automobiles, each weighing an average of 1,700 kg. Even with just 15 percent of that volume going



to landfills, that's still roughly 408 million kilograms of wasted material from cars piling up annually, or the weight of 3 1/2 CN Towers going to the dump each year.

Clearly, there's plenty of room for improvement. "The short-term objectives are, how can we get better at dealing with that 15 percent that's still mostly lost?" says Edwin Tam, a recycling expert and associate professor of civil and environmental engineering at the University of Windsor.

Plastic makes up the bulk of automotive landfill waste. But according to ARC, it's not economically viable to pull apart and recycle all the different plastics found in cars, trucks and SUVs. The organization is, however, studying the issue in order to meet Canada's goal of zero plastic waste by 2030. Among the proposals are the creation of a database to catalog the many types of plastics found in vehicles, as well as offering a bounty on plastic bumpers, which are recyclable and easily removed.

## **Environmental practices**

In the longer term, figuring out how to fully recycle electric vehicles (EVs) and their resource-intensive batteries will be an important step in reducing climate change-causing carbon emissions.

"Right now, the research has generally shown the consumption stage, driving and refuelling, probably produces the most environmental impact overall," Tam says. In a future where EVs are running on clean electricity, he explains, the biggest source of emissions will likely come from the production stage, rather than consumption. "Where are you getting the materials from? How are they being extracted? Can you close the loop and get all that precious stuff out of spent batteries?" he asks.

In response, specialized recyclers are springing up, such as Toronto-based Li-Cycle Holdings, which already has EV battery recycling facilities in Ontario and New York. Another Canadian start-up, Moment Energy Inc., signed an agreement this year with Mercedes-Benz Group to turn old EV batteries into energy storage solutions for buildings.

## Improving vehicle design

Car companies, too, are thinking about design in a more environmentally

conscious way. The 2021 BMW i Vision Circular and the 2022 Polestar O2 concept cars were both created using fewer materials, can be easily dismantled and are fully recyclable.

When it's time to say goodbye to your ride, ensure you give it a proper send-off, whether you donate it to charity or sell it to a recycler. "We need to be better at most things we do for the environment," Tam says, who encourages everyone to be thoughtful about purchases and how they're eventually discarded. It's sound advice, not just for cars, but for all products we too often take for granted. CAA

# Ready for the Unexpected

# THOUGH CANADA MAY NOT have

volcanic eruptions or monsoon rains. federal data shows that our country still averages about a dozen natural disasters a year, including tornadoes and floods.

Experts say the number of natural disasters will increase as climate change prompts more extreme weather-and it's important for Canadians to be prepared. "Disasters are more common and when they do happen, they're bigger," says Joshua Bezanson, a physician and the host of the podcast Emergency Preparedness



# PREP FOR **OUTAGES**

Natural disasters can leave you without light, heat and hot water. But you won't feel left in the dark with these tips.

- Purchase a gas-powered generator or a residential-sized backup battery.
- Use a wood-burning fireplace to stay warm, but ensure the chimney is cleaned every year.
- Unplug your electronics to prevent damage from a power surge.
- If you use candles, make sure they're in a proper holder and extinguish them before bed.
- Don't open your fridge or freezer unless it's absolutely necessary. Food will keep for up to 48 hours in the freezer and for 12 to 24 hours in the fridge if left closed.
- Never use a barbecue or camping stove inside the house, as they emit carbon monoxide, which can be fatal.

in Canada (EPIC). "Just playing the odds, it's increasingly likely that you will be directly affected."

There are four types of extreme weather you may encounter in Canada.

# **FLOODS**

As flooding is the most frequent natural disaster in

the country, Jim Montgomery of the non-profit group Community Disaster Response Ontario recommends putting well guards around your basement windows. He also suggests installing both a sump pump, which prevents water from pooling in your basement, and a backflow valve, which blocks sewage from entering your house. If flooding is imminent, move your emergency supplies, furniture, valuables and family keepsakes above ground level. Don't attempt to turn off your home's electricity when waters are rising, as that could lead to a fatal shock.

# TORNADOES

The prairies and southwestern Ontario are especially fertile

ground for twisters. If you live in a highrisk area, listen to your local radio station during severe thunderstorms and pay attention to emergency alerts on your mobile device. If one hits and you're at home, take refuge in the basement, or a small ground-floor room, like a bathroom. In an apartment or office building, seek shelter in an inner hallway or room on a low floor. If you're driving, look for the nearest sturdy shelter. If there isn't one, leave your car and hide in a low-lying area. like a ditch.

# WILDFIRES

Devastating blazes are expected to become more

common as Canada's climate changes. In rural areas, remove fallen branches, dried leaves and other potential fire hazards from around your home. If a wildfire

is approaching, close all doors and windows and cover your air vents. Turn on any sprinklers installed on your roof, shut off the natural gas if you have it, and move propane barbecues away from the house. Follow any evacuation orders too. For an up-to-date map of wildfires, visit the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Centre website (ciffc.ca).



## ICE STORMS

Freezing rain is detrimental to the power grid. Too much

and it can topple trees and power lines, leading to blackouts that can last days or even weeks. When a severe storm is in the forecast, the Red Cross recommends



readying your emergency kit (see "Gear Up" below), chimney, generator or battery pack, if you have one. Venture outside only if you have to. If you do, be on the lookout for downed power lines and wobbly tree branches.



## BE PROACTIVE

Research hazards in your immediate area and conduct

a risk assessment. The government has emergency preparedness websites that outline which neighbourhoods are prone to flooding, forest fires and other extreme weather conditions (getprepared.gc.ca). Develop an emergency plan tailored to your home and family. Refresh the plan

- Hand sanitizer
- Important documents, including copies of your health card and driver's licence

- Clothes and shoes
- Toiletries
- Cards and board games
- Pet supplies, including food, water and medication

mobile device"



twice a year, once in early winter and again in early summer, so you know what to do in every season.

One of the most important things is to have a plan to communicate and reunite with your family, says Kim Fournier, author of *The Seven Steps to Emergency Preparedness for Families*. She recommends establishing a primary point of contact, like a parent, and one in a different city, in case you have to evacuate to another area.

In an emergency, cellular networks can be overwhelmed by phone calls. Communicate by text if possible, which uses much less bandwidth, or an app like Two Way: Walkie Talkie, which allows you to use your phone as a two-way radio.

But experts say not to go overboard. "We all need to live our lives," says Montgomery. "Disaster preparedness isn't something you need to think about every day." But it's important to think proactively. CAA







Since becoming a CAA Member in 2005, Amy MacAdam has known the value of roadside assistance, but it was only after buying a new car that she fully understood the CAA difference.
